Under their stewardship several new staff have been recruited, including CEO Frances Guy, and they have hit the ground running. I hope all our members will agree with me that changes brought about by the new team are already evident in a revitalised digital presence, a fascinating annual conference and exciting work streams on the horizon.

Opportunities presented themselves during 2021 for the Alliance to make itself heard on behalf of members. We were vocal leading into the 2021 Scottish Election, during COP26 and contributed to important conversations taking place in Scottish society. There is still opportunity for the strength and efficacy of our voice to improve through 2022.

COP26 was an opportunity for many of our members to showcase the important work they are doing on the frontlines of climate action and response. Our inaugural Cross Party Group meeting of the new Scottish parliamentary session helped build momentum for the Scottish Government's announcement of support for a Climate Loss and Damage fund, demonstrating the value of a network of members bringing together diverse actors.

The Alliance and its members have become adept at managing online meetings, virtual conferences and digital evaluation tools. In doing so, we may have lost the spontaneity of face-to-face meetings, but all events hosted by the Alliance have benefitted from wider, more diverse participation. The challenge for the next year will be to move towards a hybrid model that allows and encourages those not physically present to actively participate in debate and discussion.

Looking ahead offers little comfort, with the impacts of climate change continuing to manifest, and conflict once again threatening to break out in Europe. The Alliance must and will continue to engage the Scottish public on the importance of global development. And the Alliance will continue to support the success of our members in their endeavours, at a time when they have never been more needed.

# A Voice for Change in the Sector

We continued to act as a voice on issues important to our sector, collaborating with over 150 different organisations, and hosting over 624 people as attendees at our events, workshops and trainings. We advocate for a progressive, engaged and vibrant international development community in Scotland, and aim to influence key decision makers on important issues. Prior to the Scotlish Election in May 2021, we published our 2021-2026 Policy Priorities for Scotland, influencing various political parties' election manifestos, including on the need for new legislation on wellbeing and sustainable development.

In 2021, we drafted a discussion paper titled 'Reflecting on language in international development in Scotland' that aims to put forward some ideas on why it is vital to reflect on our language in the context of anti-racism and decolonisation. We hope to develop this into a Toolkit, with the input of members and experts in decolonisation and language policy.

### Focus on **Climate**

With growing public awareness of the climate crisis, as well as the arrival of COP26 in Glasgow, we were particularly keen to emphasise that climate change is nearly always felt most acutely by those that have done least to cause it, often people in low-income countries, with the lowest carbon footprint. We launched **Facing the Crisis** as a digital exhibition that illustrates the human impact of the climate crisis, and in November, took this exhibition to the Cryosphere at COP26 within our role as official observer.

### **Learning Together**

Due to the continuing COVID-19 pandemic, our effectiveness & learning services have been held entirely online this year, using virtual space to host trainings, webinars, and 4 working groups. Whilst we know that members missed in-person interaction, the pivot to virtual services has resulted in a more globally accessible and inclusive way of operating that we intend to maintain as we develop hybrid events. In total, our events this year reached people from at least 25 different countries.

Our commitment to supporting members to operate efficiently and sustainably continued with the revision of the **Effectiveness Toolkit.** An update to draw on the experience of key stakeholders, resulted in a more refined, efficient and inclusive Toolkit, designed to help organisations assess priority areas for action and plan for continuous improvement, with useful tips, resources and quidance.

Through our events this year, we have prioritised participation and leadership from people living in lower-income countries, and have encouraged our members to amplify the voices of those living in their partner countries. At the 2021 virtual Annual Conference, over 50% of speakers were from the Global South, bringing their expert knowledge and experience to conversations around the climate crisis, well-being and equity. With attendees joining from over 20 different countries, the discussions were broad ranging, engaging and powerful.
